Remembering the 1968 Floods



On 19 September a packed Mole Hall enjoyed an evening of reminiscence on the 40th anniversary of the 1968 floods.

Four members described their personal experiences and it was fascinating to watch TV newsreels of the floods themselves and then film of a year later, when people were still suffering the after effects. Also on display were photographs and newspaper coverage of this memorable event.

Sisley and the Thames at Molesey

On 18 November 2008 an audience of about 190 heard a quite excellent lecture about Alfred Sisley and his paintings of the Thames at Molesey in 1874 and his later paintings of the Welsh coast in 1897. The speaker, Nicholas Reed, had an encyclopaedic knowledge of Sisley and his paintings. He spoke fluently without notes and his enthusiasm for the subject was both obvious and infectious. His slides vividly showed the colour in the paintings and details, such as the man with a yellow straw hat, thought to be Sisley himself.

Our speaker also had a very comprehensive knowledge of Thameside Molesey and the changes that have occurred there since Sisley's visit. It was fascinating to see photographs of buildings that have disappeared relatively recently, including the Upper Deck Swimming Pool, the Watercraft Works and, topically, the Jolly Boatman. It was a privilege to have a lecturer of such high quality.

Magical Molesey Fred Karno & the Karsino

The Crusade of the Tilbury Hope

The Thames pleasure launch Tilbury Hope docked at Westminster Pier and the ladies of East Molesey stormed ashore, carrying protest banners to present a petition to the Ministry of Housing against the Surrey development plan. So reported the Sun, and other national newspapers, in June 1965.

It had not all been smooth sailing. Although a dignified protest, with refreshments of tea and biscuits served by the ladies during the voyage from Kew to Westminster, there was trouble when the pier master spotted the banners decorating the boat. In breach of the Port of London Authority's rules on 'advertising' on the river, they were ordered to take their banners down and even to remove a Union Jack they had draped over the bows, or risk the penalty of a £50 fine. 'Typical bureaucracy!' snorted Miss Veronica Tudor Williams – who was then living at Matham Manor and feared the plan would involve her historic home.

However, as they chugged past the Houses of Parliament, where MPs were drinking beer on the terrace, a large banner proclaiming 'Hands off Molesey' suddenly unfurled. 'It must have been a gust of wind. I'm positive no one would break regulations', said Mrs Joan Wilson, who was supervising the picnic baskets.

This genteel protest, which ended in a picnic in St James' Park, was but one strand of the successful fight against high density redevelopment plans, which would have completely changed the nature of Molesey, making it a much less pleasant place to live.

A rousing editorial entitled 'How to beat Big Brother' appeared in the Daily Express in February 1966, when Surrey County Council abandoned the plans, complimenting the people of East Molesey for banding together and in the process finding their community spirit.

Newspaper cuttings were found amongst papers relating to Matham Manor, undoubtedly collected by Miss Veronica Tudor Williams, mentioned above. The cuttings will be displayed at the Members Evening on Tuesday 20 January.
